The crucifix is feet high and the crown is 14 feet in diameter. Together they weigh 2,000 pounds. What is the circumference of the crown? (Hint: pi = 3.14)
Back to counting beans:
The original cost of building the Cathedral from 1886-1889 was in today's money. There are over works of art painted by Evergreen Studios in the Cathedral.





A liturgist has a special function in the Catholic Church. This person, now you, helps the people of the church become closer to God. Your job is to interpret the symbols placed in the Cathedral to help us be closer to God and to feel his presence.

Most symbols in the church speak silently and the people must look carefully and thoughtfully to completely understand. Some symbols are the same in every Catholic church, and some are special to the individual church. Think carefully first about the name of the Cathedral as you research and walk around.

A laconic person is one of few words. You are laconic as the liturgist because you must see the symbols and explain them in just a few words. Be sure that you are seeking the deeper meaning behind each symbol. Take some time to ponder, understand, and then meditate when you visit the Cathedral.

Saint Historian
